



My Dear Parishioners,

Praised be Jesus Christ! The 3rd week of January is always a chilly one for America. Not just in terms of temperature, but in terms of history. Over the course of these coming days, we mark the birth of the great civil rights leader, Martin Luther King Jr, 1/15/29. And then, we mark the Anniversary of the court decision that took away the right to be born for all unborn children, the Roe-vs.-Wade, 1/22/73. The proximity of days for these two anniversaries could not be starker. In the first case, a man who fought for civil rights his whole life. In the second case, the taking away of the ultimate civil right, the right to life. This year, these two anniversaries are made all the more chilly as we experience Inauguration Day 2021. Chilly not only because of our new president's support of abortion but because of all the turmoil, violence and division found in our country today. One might say that the United States of America is not so united.

As Christians living in these times, what do we do? That question could yield lots of good answers and it would do us well to consider the question. In the coming weeks, I will do that via a few video reflections. But for now, let's simply consider our Lord, who also lived in divided and unjust times.

The greatest act of injustice was the Betrayal, Condemnation and Killing of Jesus Christ. In the face of that, Jesus was neither or a doormat nor a zealot. He was Son of the Eternal Father. In that time, his actions spoke volumes. Whether it was his silence, his forgiveness, his love or his works of mercy. In all things, He spoke and lived Truth. As people who have been baptized into Him, we must do the same. Falling victim to neither division, despair nor anger, but falling more deeply in loving union with Him and allowing that union to form our acting, our thinking and our willing.

A beautiful example of this taking shape in our community is the Chester County Women's Services. Located in the heart of our town, right next to the Country Butcher, they do excellent work.
